Introduction to the artist: Boca Chica

Boca Chica is an orchestral twang pop band from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Led by songwriter Hallie Pritts, their songs are dark, catchy, and combine somewhat surreal lyrics and instrumentation with bar band appeal. Drawing influences from classic country stars, Boca Chica filters those twangy tendencies through a modern indie pop lens.

About the band

Boca Chica is a band that thrives on collaboration and with this new EardrumsPop release they take it to a new level. Not only do these songs benefit from internal band collaboration, but each song represents a melding of minds-- be it with a writer like Jacob Liechty on »For Jacob with Malaria«, another band like Lohio on »Afternoon Tea«, or with another songwriter like Nik Westman on »You're the Blues«.

Boca Chica pushes the boundaries of what it means to be a »band«, having had more than 40 different members since their inception and their current lineup includes Hallie Pritts, Susanna Meyer, J. Vega, Ricky Moslen, James Hart, and Kraig Decker.

The Cover Art Designer: Anne Roecklein

Anne Roecklein is a creative professional living and working in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania (US). Her work is about our attempts to know and understand the world through our desires. Her collage and assemblage pieces address relationships between original/reproduction, parts/whole, real/imaginary, and the visual impact of accumulation.

»» **Please tell us about the process of making the EardrumsPop-cover! Is this the way you usually work?**

I focused in on a section of a larger collage titled 'pop song' to make this cover. It's all based on the way I usually work, but tailored to Boca Chica, these new songs, and the needs of a record cover.

»» **Who / what are your greatest visual inspirations?**

There are many artists and designers who I respect, but I think it's more interesting to talk about the stuff that I see that sparks ideas, like: fishing lures, jelly fish, diatoms, neatly stacked produce at the grocery store, satellites, graphs — this list could get really long.

»» **Is music or other forms of art an inspiration? If so, what do you listen to?**

I love listening to music when I'm in the studio, usually with my huge, dorky headphones on. And music is incredibly inspirational to me. It's so direct, and emotional, and sometimes overwhelming. I want my work to have an impact like this but we experience visual things so differently, so much quieter usually. Music makes me think about mood in my own work, and makes me want to make big pieces with a lot of visual density. My current iPod favorites are all over the place: Luna, ELO, Ratatat, Electrelane, Camera Obscura, Stars, Band of Annuals, and Boca Chica, of course.





1) Take a photo of an ear, but make it real strange, artistic or unrecognisable.




2) What's the most precious thing you'd smash up or break just for the purpose of taking a photo of it all broken and smashed for this interview?



3) Tell us a secret.




4) What does life mean to you?




5) Define infinity.

About the songs:

»For Jacob with Malaria«

This song was born out of the Boca Chica Kickstarter campaign of last fall. One of the rewards offered was the chance to commission a Boca Chica song on the topic of one's choice. Writer and artist Jacob Liechty of Denver, Colorado sent Hallie a story he had written about his time living in Mali. In particular, it was about getting malaria in Bamako and spending time in a clinic with another sick friend. He asked Hallie to write a song inspired by the story. The result is a decidedly hallucinatory folk track.
